SECTION 2 - INSTRUCTIONS TO OFFERORS

A Introduction

1. General

Background:

United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) is the development arm of United Nations contributing to development of over 160 countries across the globe. In Afghanistan too it remains the key development partner of Government of Afghanistan (GoA). Currently, UNDP is implementing a number of projects across all 34 provinces of Afghanistan with varying geographical coverage by different projects.

UNDP projects are implemented under the thematic programme units of Country Office i.e. Natural Resources and Environment, Crisis Prevention and Recovery, Democratic Governance, Local Governance and Administration and Poverty Reduction and Sustainable Livelihoods. The projects implemented under the mentioned programme units focuses on police sector, disaster management and early recovery, area based rural development, strengthening of local governance and administration, justice sector, disbandment of illegal armed groups, support to peace and reintegration, strengthening accountability and transparency mechanisms etc.

Monitoring and Evaluation is an integral part of project/programme implementation across all practice areas in UNDP Afghanistan. To this end, the programme units are responsible for undertaking this role to ensure delivery of quality results within set time frames and accountability to the government, donors and the people of Afghanistan. However, expanded geographical presence of UNDP, limited human resources within mentioned programme units and other complexities in the fields reduces coverage of monitoring missions undertaken by UNDP. Moreover, corporate restrictions on UNDP staff in terms of field mobility also limit mobility of staff to certain project geographical locations. Therefore UNDP following a competitive process is seeking to hire an independent Monitoring Agent (MA) to ensure monitoring of all UNDP activities being carried out within its development projects framework across the country

2. Cost of proposal

The Offeror shall bear all costs associated with the preparation and submission of the Proposal, the UNDP will in no case be responsible or liable for those costs, regardless of the conduct or outcome of the solicitation.

B Solicitation Documents

3. Contents of solicitation documents

Proposals must offer services for the total requirement. Proposals offering only part of the requirement will be rejected. The Offeror is expected to examine all corresponding instructions, forms, terms and specifications contained in the Solicitation Documents. Failure to comply with these documents will be at the Offeror's risk and may affect the evaluation of the Proposal.

4. Clarification of solicitation documents

A prospective Offeror requiring any clarification of the Solicitation Documents may notify UNDP in writing by fax or e-mail as indicated and permitted in the RFP. UNDP will respond in writing to any request for clarification of the Solicitation Documents that it receives earlier than two weeks prior to the deadline for the submission of Proposals. Written copies of UNDP's response (including an explanation of the query but without identifying the source of inquiry) will be sent to all prospective Offerors that has received the Solicitation Documents.

5. Amendments of solicitation documents

At any time prior to the deadline for submission of Proposals, UNDP may, for any reason, whether at its own initiative or in response to a clarification requested by a prospective Offeror, modify the Solicitation Documents by amendment.

All prospective Offerors that have received the Solicitation Documents will be notified in writing of all amendments to the Solicitation Documents.

In order to afford prospective Offerors a reasonable time in which to take the amendments into account in preparing their offers, UNDP may, at its discretion, extend the deadline for the submission of Proposals.

C Preparation of Proposals

6. Language of the proposal

The Proposals prepared by the Offeror and all correspondence and documents relating to the Proposal exchanged by the Offeror and UNDP shall be written in the English language. Any printed literature furnished by the Offeror may be written in another language so long as accompanied by an English translation of its pertinent passages in which case, for purposes of interpretation of the Proposal, the English translation shall govern.

13. Evaluation and comparison of proposals

14. Evaluation criteria

The evaluation of the successful proposal shall be based upon most responsiveness to UNDP requirements and shall not be solely restricted to the lowest fees proposed.

The evaluation of the proposals received by UNDP will be based on a combination of the substantive presentation and the competitiveness of the fees. The criteria of evaluation will comprise these elements with a total of 100 points.

A two-stage procedure is utilised in evaluating the proposals, with the technical evaluation being completed prior to any financial proposal being opened and compared. Only proposals that achieve above the minimum of 70% scores threshold points on the substantive presentation shall be reviewed for price.

15. Evaluation of substantive presentation (1000 points)

The potential capacity to have quality services provided to UNDP will be considered on the basis of a mix of:

- Expertise of Firm / Organization submitting Proposal (200 points)
- Proposed Work Plan and Approach (500 points)
- professional Personnel (300 points)

7. Financial Proposal

In the Second Stage, the price proposal of all contractors, who have attained minimum 70% score in the technical evaluation, will be compared. The contract will be awarded to the Contractor offering the lowest price responsive proposal.

8. Proposal currencies

All prices shall be quoted in US dollars only.

9. Period of validity of proposals

Proposals shall remain valid for ninety days (90) days after the date of Proposal submission prescribed by UNDP, pursuant to the deadline clause. A Proposal valid for a shorter period may be rejected by UNDP on the grounds that it is non-responsive.

In exceptional circumstances, UNDP may solicit the Offeror's consent to an extension of the period of validity. The request and the responses thereto shall be made in writing.

An Offeror granting the request will not be required nor permitted to modify its Proposal.

10. Format and signing of proposals

The Offeror shall prepare two copies of the Proposal, clearly marking each “Original Proposal” and “Copy of Proposal” as appropriate. In the event of any discrepancy between them, the original shall govern.

The two copies of the Proposal shall be typed or written in indelible ink and shall be signed by the Offeror or a person or persons duly authorised to bind the Offeror to the contract. The latter authorisation shall be indicated by written power-of-attorney accompanying the Proposal.

A Proposal shall contain no interlineations, erasures, or overwriting except, as necessary to correct errors made by the Offeror, in which case such corrections shall be initialed by the person or persons signing the Proposal.

11. Payment

UNDP shall effect payments to the Contractor after acceptance by UNDP of the invoices submitted by the contractor, upon achievement of the corresponding milestones in accordance with the payment terms in the contract.

Payments shall be made by bank transfer directly to the bank account of the Contractor. UNDP shall only make payment transfers into accounts in the Contractor’s (company) name and not of individuals (even owners of the Company).

D Submission of Proposals

- (b) Both inner envelopes shall indicate the name and address of the Offeror. The first inner envelope shall contain the information specified in Clause 8 (*Proposal form*) above, with the copies duly marked “Original” and “Copy”. The second inner envelope shall include the price schedule duly identified as such.

Note, if the inner envelopes are not sealed and marked as per the instructions in this clause, UNDP will not assume responsibility for the Proposal’s misplacement or premature opening.

13. Deadline for submission of proposals

Proposals must be received by UNDP at the address or e-mail no later than the deadline specified in the Letter of Invitation.

UNDP may, at its own discretion extend this deadline for the submission of Proposals by amending the solicitation documents in accordance with clause *Amendments of Solicitation Documents*, in which case all rights and obligations of UNDP and Offerors previously subject to the deadline will thereafter be subject to the deadline as extended.

14. Late Proposals

Any Proposal received by the procuring UNDP entity after the deadline for submission of proposals, pursuant to clause *Deadline for the submission of proposals*, will be rejected.

15. Modification and withdrawal of Proposals

The Offeror may withdraw its Proposal after the Proposal’s submission, provided that written notice of the withdrawal is received by UNDP prior to the deadline prescribed for submission of Proposals.

The Offeror’s withdrawal notice shall be prepared, sealed, marked, and dispatched in accordance with the provisions of clause *Deadline for Submission of Proposals*. The withdrawal notice may also be sent by telex or fax but followed by a signed confirmation copy.

No Proposal may be modified subsequent to the deadline for submission of proposals.

E Opening and Evaluation of Proposals

16. Opening of proposals

UNDP will open the Proposals in the presence of a Committee formed by the duly authorized official of UNDP.

17. Clarification of proposals

To assist in the examination, evaluation and comparison of Proposals, UNDP may at its discretion, ask the Offeror for clarification of its Proposal. The request for clarification and the response shall be in writing and no change in price or substance of the Proposal shall be sought, offered or permitted.

18. Preliminary examination

UNDP will examine the Proposals to determine whether they are complete, whether any computational errors have been made, whether the documents have been properly signed, and whether the Proposals are generally in order.

Arithmetical errors will be rectified on the following basis: If there is a discrepancy between the unit price and the total price that is obtained by multiplying the unit price and quantity, the unit price shall prevail and the total price shall be corrected. If the Offeror does not accept the correction of errors, its Proposal will be rejected. If there is a discrepancy between words and figures the amount in words will prevail.

Prior to the detailed evaluation, UNDP will determine the substantial responsiveness of each Proposal to the Request for Proposals (RFP). For purposes of these Clauses, a substantially responsive Proposal is one, which conforms to all the terms and conditions of the RFP without material deviations. UNDP's determination of a Proposal's responsiveness is based on the contents of the Proposal itself without recourse to extrinsic evidence.

A Proposal determined as not substantially responsive will be rejected by UNDP and may not subsequently be made responsive by the Offeror by correction of the non-conformity.

19. Evaluation and comparison of proposals

A two-stage procedure is utilized in evaluating the proposals, with evaluation of the technical proposal being completed prior to any price proposal being opened and compared. The price proposal of the Proposals will be opened only for submissions that passed the minimum technical score of 70% of the obtainable score of 100 points in the evaluation of the technical proposals.

The technical proposal is evaluated on the basis of its responsiveness to the Term of Reference (TOR).

In the Second Stage, the price proposal of all offerors, who have attained minimum 70% score in the technical evaluation will be opened and compared. Price Proposals of offerors who have not passed the technical evaluation will be returned to the respective offerors unopened at the end of the evaluation process, if the form of receipt specified is by sealed envelopes or discarded if by e-mail.

For evaluation purposes only, the evaluated price for each lot of each proposal shall be determined as follows:

The award of contract shall be proposed lowest evaluated priced proposal will be awarded 100 points and other prices proposals will be awarded points in accordance with the following formula:

The technical and price scores of offerors will be combined using a weighting of 70% technical and 30% price. The contract will be awarded to the offeror achieving the highest combined technical/price score.

F Award of Contract

20. Award criteria, award of contract

UNDP reserves the right to accept or reject any Proposal, and to annul the solicitation process and reject all Proposals at any time prior to award of contract, without thereby incurring any liability to the affected Offeror or any obligation to inform the affected Offeror or Offerors of the grounds for the Purchaser's action.

Prior to expiration of the period of proposal validity, UNDP will award a contract to the qualified Offeror whose Proposal after being evaluated is considered to be the most responsive to the needs of the organization and activity concerned.

21. UNDP's right to vary requirements at time of award

UNDP reserves the right at the time of award of contract to vary the quantity of services and goods specified in the RFP without any change in price or other terms and conditions.

22. Signing of the contract

Within 7 days of receipt of the contract the successful Offeror shall sign and date the contract and return it to UNDP.

SECTION 3 – TERMS OF REFERENCE

Background:

United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) is the development arm of United Nations contributing to development of over 160 countries across the globe. In Afghanistan too it remains the key development partner of Government of Afghanistan (GoA). Currently, UNDP is implementing a number of projects across all 34 provinces of Afghanistan with varying geographical coverage by different projects.

I. Purpose

The main purpose of engagement of MA is to supplement UNDP's current array of activities in the area of M&E particularly monitoring of UNDP activities across the regions in Afghanistan. This practice will not only result in timely delivery of project results within set quality criteria but will ensure transparency, accountability and responsiveness to development needs and priorities in Afghanistan. The independence of the MA team will also provide the much needed external assessment and analysis of UNDP work and will provide much needed external feedback for timely decision making and enhancing the effectiveness and efficiency in UNDP work.

The MA will conduct regular monitoring missions to identified areas in full concurrence with the UNDP Monitoring Plan. The monitoring mission by MA will result in comprehensive result oriented monitoring reports covering activity and output levels. The report will eventually feed into measurement process of project progress and its contribution in achieving project results (outputs, outcomes and impacts) as per the approved Annual Work Plan, Project Document and the UNDP Programme Document.

This will allow UNDP Afghanistan to make informed and timely decisions and instigate timely remedial actions as and when necessary about the project(s) concerned. In addition, the process will enable UNDP Afghanistan to report back to the GoA and donors on pre-planned project results. The data collection/reports will also contribute towards reporting on outputs and indicators of Country Programme Action Plan (CPAP), Country Programme Document (CPD) and United Nations Development Assistance Framework (UNDAF).

II. Details of Assignment

The MA will conduct monitoring missions as per the UNDP Afghanistan monitoring plan following a consultative process with concerned programme unit(s) and the Programme Support Unit (PSU). The process will include but not limited to data collection including beneficiary interviews, direct observation and review of documents (e.g. quarterly and annual reports, AWP, Project Document etc. In addition, the MA will be tasked to conduct a review of administrative and documentation processes (Operational aspects of the work).

- **Field Monitoring:** The MA team will conduct field monitoring missions to the target areas. The MA team is supposed to produce pictorial details of field missions besides field missions containing both qualitative and quantitative details;
- **Data Collection:** The MA team will be responsible for collection of both qualitative and quantitative data against the project(s) objectives, outputs and pertinent indicators. The data could be collected from Government counterparts, direct and indirect beneficiaries and project staff present in the field through direct communication/interviews. The data collected should help analyzing the project progress towards intended results and help in measurement of effectiveness and efficiency of the project. In addition, the report should pass the feedback of Government partners and beneficiaries on to UNDP for timely decision making. Furthermore; periodic reports should provide comparison of progress around certain issues for improved effectiveness and efficiency;
- **Direct Observation:** The MA team should also be able to report personal observation from the field. The personal observation should be the key feature of MA periodic reports complementing and supplementing other monitoring sources;
- **Document Review:** The MA will also be required to review certain documents such as other monitoring reports produced by project staff, reports of government officials, periodic project reports and other relevant documents and use as source of monitoring for supplementing and complementing the other sources;
- **Reporting and Presentation:** The MA team will be required to produce monthly and quarterly reports, using UNDP approved template, capturing details of field monitoring activities as detailed above. The reports should help UNDP management make informed and timely decisions for improving and enhancing project effectiveness and efficiency of the projects while addressing concerns of beneficiaries. Moreover, progress against performance indicators should also be detailed in the quarterly reports of MA measuring overall progress as well as progress over reporting

period. The periodic reports should be aligned with geographical presence of UNDP and project based focus. The MA will also have to produce summary of reports for senior executives. The reports should come up with precise findings and recommendations. Moreover, the MA will be required to deliver presentations on the monitoring findings to both internal and external audiences as agreed between the MA and UNDP;

- The MA will need to observe and follow UNDP's guiding principles in the area of M&E in undertaking the assignments above.

III. Deliverables

- A comprehensive monitoring plan should be produced with detailed monitoring methodology, clear benchmarks and reporting milestones;
- Monthly and Quarterly monitoring reports in agreed template containing precise findings and recommendations;
- Presentations to internal and external audiences;

IV. MA Team Composition

- The monitoring team should be comprised of adequate number of qualified national and (possibly) international development professionals;
- The team should include staff with advanced university degrees or equivalent in development, business management and other relevant field;
- Team leader should have at least 10 years of work experience and expertise in the field of development;
- The team should be comprised of professional with adequate amount of proven Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) experience (minimum experience of three years);
- The MA team should be comprised of experts in data collection (qualitative and quantitative), analysis and reporting;
- The team members should be able to deliver presentations to both national and international audiences on field monitoring activities;

V. UNDP Support

UNDP will supply all required documents such as project documents, project strategies, annual work plans and other related documents. In addition, UNDP concerned programme unit(s) and the PSU will facilitate field level communication of MA with government and beneficiaries and other project target groups. UNDP will also present/explain details of projects to the MA team for improved understanding of UNDP work.

VI. Logistical Arrangements

The MA will be required to submit an estimated budget for one year, along with a detailed monitoring mission plan comprising schedule and a timeframe within which the team would be fully operational. SECTION 8 – UNDP GENERAL CONDITIONS OF CONTRACTS FOR SERVICES



1.0 LEGAL STATUS:

The Contractor shall be considered as having the legal status of an independent contractor vis-à-vis the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP). The Contractor's personnel and sub-contractors shall not be considered in any respect as being the employees or agents of UNDP or the United Nations.

2.0 SOURCE OF INSTRUCTIONS:

The Contractor shall neither seek nor accept instructions from any authority external to UNDP in connection with the performance of its services under this Contract. The Contractor shall refrain from any action that may adversely affect UNDP or the United Nations and shall fulfill its commitments with the fullest regard to the interests of UNDP.

3.0 CONTRACTOR'S RESPONSIBILITY FOR EMPLOYEES:

The Contractor shall be responsible for the professional and technical competence of its employees and will select, for work under this Contract, reliable individuals who will perform effectively in the implementation of this Contract, respect the local customs, and conform to a high standard of moral and ethical conduct.

4.0 ASSIGNMENT:

The Contractor shall not assign, transfer, pledge or make other disposition of this Contract or any part thereof, or any of the Contractor's rights, claims or obligations under this Contract except with the prior written consent of UNDP.

5.0 SUB-CONTRACTING:

In the event the Contractor requires the services of sub-contractors, the Contractor shall obtain the prior written approval and clearance of UNDP for all sub-contractors. The approval of UNDP of a sub-contractor shall not relieve the Contractor of any of its obligations under this Contract. The terms of any sub-contract shall be subject to and conform to the provisions of this Contract.

6.0 OFFICIALS NOT TO BENEFIT:

The Contractor warrants that no official of UNDP or the United Nations has received or will be offered by the Contractor any direct or indirect benefit arising from this Contract or the award thereof. The Contractor agrees that breach of this provision is a breach of an essential term of this Contract.

7.0 INDEMNIFICATION:

The Contractor shall indemnify, hold and save harmless, and defend, at its own expense, UNDP, its officials, agents, servants and employees from and against all suits, claims, demands, and liability of any nature or kind, including their costs and expenses, arising out of acts or omissions of the Contractor, or the Contractor's employees, officers, agents or sub-contractors, in the performance of this Contract. This provision shall extend, inter alia, to claims and liability in the nature of workmen's compensation, products liability and liability arising out of the use of patented inventions or devices, copyrighted material or other intellectual property by the Contractor, its employees, officers, agents, servants or sub-contractors. The obligations under this Article do not lapse upon termination of this Contract.

8.0 INSURANCE AND LIABILITIES TO THIRD PARTIES:

8.1 The Contractor shall provide and thereafter maintain insurance against all risks in respect of its property and any equipment used for the execution of this Contract.

8.2 The Contractor shall provide and thereafter maintain all appropriate workmen's compensation insurance, or the equivalent, with respect to its employees to cover claims for personal injury or death in connection with this Contract.

8.3 The Contractor shall also provide and thereafter maintain liability insurance in an adequate amount to cover third party claims for death or bodily injury, or loss of or damage to property, arising from or in connection with the provision of services under this Contract or the operation of any vehicles, boats, airplanes or other equipment owned or leased by the Contractor or its agents, servants, employees or sub-contractors performing work or services in connection with this Contract.

8.4 Except for the workmen's compensation insurance, the insurance policies under this Article shall:

8.4.1 Name UNDP as additional insured;

8.4.2 Include a waiver of subrogation of the Contractor's rights to the insurance carrier against the UNDP;

8.4.3 Provide that the UNDP shall receive thirty (30) days written notice from the insurers prior to any cancellation or change of coverage.

8.5 The Contractor shall, upon request, provide the UNDP with satisfactory evidence of the insurance required under this Article.

9.0 ENCUMBRANCES/LIENS:

The Contractor shall not cause or permit any lien, attachment or other encumbrance by any person to be placed on file or to remain on file in any public office or on file with the UNDP against any monies due or to become due for any work done or materials furnished under this Contract, or by reason of any other claim or demand against the Contractor.

10.0 TITLE TO EQUIPMENT: Title to any equipment and supplies that may be furnished by UNDP shall rest with UNDP and any such equipment shall be returned to UNDP at the conclusion of this Contract or when no longer needed by the Contractor. Such equipment, when returned to UNDP, shall be in the same condition as when delivered to the Contractor, subject to normal wear and tear. The Contractor shall be liable to compensate UNDP for equipment determined to be damaged or degraded beyond normal wear and tear.

11.0 COPYRIGHT, PATENTS AND OTHER PROPRIETARY RIGHTS:

11.1 Except as is otherwise expressly provided in writing in the Contract, the UNDP shall be entitled to all intellectual property and other proprietary rights including, but not limited to, patents, copyrights, and trademarks, with regard to products, processes, inventions, ideas, know-how, or documents and other materials which the Contractor has developed for the UNDP under the Contract and which bear a direct relation to or are produced or prepared or collected in consequence of, or during the course of, the performance of the Contract, and the Contractor acknowledges and agrees that such products, documents and other materials constitute works made for hire for the UNDP.

11.2 To the extent that any such intellectual property or other proprietary rights consist of any intellectual property or other proprietary rights of the Contractor: (i) that pre-existed the performance by the Contractor of its obligations under the Contract, or (ii) that the Contractor may develop or acquire, or may have developed or acquired, independently of the performance of its obligations under the Contract, the UNDP does not and shall not claim any ownership interest thereto, and the Contractor grants to the UNDP a perpetual license to use such intellectual property or other proprietary right solely for the purposes of and in accordance with the requirements of the Contract.

11.3 At the request of the UNDP; the Contractor shall take all necessary steps, execute all necessary documents and generally assist in securing such proprietary rights and transferring or licensing them to the UNDP in compliance with the requirements of the applicable law and of the Contract.

11.4 Subject to the foregoing provisions, all maps, drawings, photographs, mosaics, plans, reports, estimates, recommendations, documents, and all other data compiled by or received by the Contractor under the Contract shall be the property of the UNDP, shall be made available for use or inspection by the UNDP at reasonable times and in reasonable

places, shall be treated as confidential, and shall be delivered only to UNDP authorized officials on completion of work under the Contract.

12.0 USE OF NAME, EMBLEM OR OFFICIAL SEAL OF UNDP OR THE UNITED NATIONS:

The Contractor shall not advertise or otherwise make public the fact that it is a Contractor with UNDP, nor shall the Contractor, in any manner whatsoever use the name, emblem or official seal of UNDP or THE United Nations, or any abbreviation of the name of UNDP or United Nations in connection with its business or otherwise.

13.0 CONFIDENTIAL NATURE OF DOCUMENTS AND INFORMATION:

Information and data that is considered proprietary by either Party and that is delivered or disclosed by one Party (“Discloser”) to the other Party (“Recipient”) during the course of performance of the Contract, and that is designated as confidential (“Information”), shall be held in confidence by that Party and shall be handled as follows:

13.1 The recipient (“Recipient”) of such information shall:

13.1.1 use the same care and discretion to avoid disclosure, publication or dissemination of the Discloser’s Information as it uses with its own similar information that it does not wish to disclose, publish or disseminate; and,

13.1.2 use the Discloser’s Information solely for the purpose for which it was disclosed.

13.2 Provided that the Recipient has a written agreement with the following persons or entities requiring them to treat the Information confidential in accordance with the Contract and this Article 13, the Recipient may disclose Information to:

13.2.1 any other party with the Discloser’s prior written consent; and,

13.2.2 the Recipient’s employees, officials, representatives and agents who have a need to know such Information for purposes of performing obligations under the Contract, and employees officials, representatives and agents of any legal entity that it controls, controls it, or with which it is under common control, who have a need to know such Information for purposes of performing obligations under the Contract, provided that, for these purposes a controlled legal entity means:

13.2.2.1 a corporate entity in which the Party owns or otherwise controls, whether directly or indirectly, over fifty percent (50%) of voting shares thereof; or,

13.2.2.2 any entity over which the Party exercises effective managerial control; or,

13.2.2.3 for the UNDP, an affiliated Fund such as UNCDF, UNIFEM and UNV.

13.3 The Contractor may disclose Information to the extent required by law, provided that, subject to and without any waiver of the privileges and immunities of the United Nations, the Contractor will give the UNDP sufficient prior notice of a request for the disclosure of Information in order to allow the UNDP to have a reasonable opportunity to take protective measures or such other action as may be appropriate before any such disclosure is made.

13.4 The UNDP may disclose Information to the extent as required pursuant to the Charter of the UN, resolutions or regulations of the General Assembly, or rules promulgated by the Secretary-General.

13.5 The Recipient shall not be precluded from disclosing Information that is obtained by the Recipient from a third party without restriction, is disclosed by the Discloser to a third party without any obligation of confidentiality, is previously known by the Recipient, or at any time is developed by the Recipient completely independently of any disclosures hereunder.

13.6 These obligations and restrictions of confidentiality shall be effective during the term of the Contract, including any extension thereof, and, unless otherwise provided in the Contract, shall remain effective following any termination of the Contract.

14.0 FORCE MAJEURE; OTHER CHANGES IN CONDITIONS

14.1 In the event of and as soon as possible after the occurrence of any cause constituting force majeure, the Contractor shall give notice and full particulars in writing to the UNDP, of such occurrence or change if the Contractor is thereby rendered unable, wholly or in part, to perform its obligations and meet its responsibilities under this Contract. The Contractor shall also notify the UNDP of any other changes in conditions or the occurrence of any event that interferes or threatens to interfere with its performance of this Contract. On receipt of the notice required under this Article, the UNDP shall take such action as, in its sole discretion; it considers to be appropriate or necessary in the circumstances, including the granting to the Contractor of a reasonable extension of time in which to perform its obligations under this Contract.

14.2 If the Contractor is rendered permanently unable, wholly, or in part, by reason of force majeure to perform its obligations and meet its responsibilities under this Contract, the UNDP shall have the right to suspend or terminate this Contract on the same terms and conditions as are provided for in Article 15, "Termination", except that the period of notice shall be seven (7) days instead of thirty (30) days.

14.3 Force majeure as used in this Article means acts of God, war (whether declared or not), invasion, revolution, insurrection, or other acts of a similar nature or force.

14.4 The Contractor acknowledges and agrees that, with respect to any obligations under the Contract that the Contractor must perform in or for any areas in which the UNDP is engaged in, preparing to engage in, or disengaging from any peacekeeping, humanitarian or similar operations, any delays or failure to perform such obligations arising from or

relating to harsh conditions within such areas or to any incidents of civil unrest occurring in such areas shall not, in and of itself, constitute force majeure under the Contract..

15.0 TERMINATION

15.1 Either party may terminate this Contract for cause, in whole or in part, upon thirty (30) days notice, in writing, to the other party. The initiation of arbitral proceedings in accordance with Article 16.2 (“Arbitration”), below, shall not be deemed a termination of this Contract.

15.2 UNDP reserves the right to terminate without cause this Contract at any time upon 15 days prior written notice to the Contractor, in which case UNDP shall reimburse the Contractor for all reasonable costs incurred by the Contractor prior to receipt of the notice of termination.

15.3 In the event of any termination by UNDP under this Article, no payment shall be due from UNDP to the Contractor except for work and services satisfactorily performed in conformity with the express terms of this Contract.

15.4 Should the Contractor be adjudged bankrupt, or be liquidated or become insolvent, or should the Contractor make an assignment for the benefit of its creditors, or should a Receiver be appointed on account of the insolvency of the Contractor, the UNDP may, without prejudice to any other right or remedy it may have under the terms of these conditions, terminate this Contract forthwith. The Contractor shall immediately inform the UNDP of the occurrence of any of the above events.

16.0 SETTLEMENT OF DISPUTES

16.1 Amicable Settlement: The Parties shall use their best efforts to settle amicably any dispute, controversy or claim arising out of this Contract or the breach, termination or invalidity thereof. Where the parties wish to seek such an amicable settlement through conciliation, the conciliation shall take place in accordance with the UNCITRAL Conciliation Rules then obtaining, or according to such other procedure as may be agreed between the parties.

16.2 Arbitration: Any dispute, controversy, or claim between the Parties arising out of the Contract or the breach, termination, or invalidity thereof, unless settled amicably under Article 16.1, above, within sixty (60) days after receipt by one Party of the other Party’s written request for such amicable settlement, shall be referred by either Party to arbitration in accordance with the UNCITRAL Arbitration Rules then obtaining. The decisions of the arbitral tribunal shall be based on general principles of international commercial law. For all evidentiary questions, the arbitral tribunal shall be guided by the Supplementary Rules Governing the Presentation and Reception of Evidence in International Commercial Arbitration of the International Bar Association, 28 May 1983 edition. The arbitral tribunal shall be empowered to order the return or destruction of goods or any property, whether tangible or intangible, or of any confidential information provided under the Contract, order the termination of the Contract, or order that any other protective measures

be taken with respect to the goods, services or any other property, whether tangible or intangible, or of any confidential information provided under the Contract, as appropriate, all in accordance with the authority of the arbitral tribunal pursuant to Article 26 (“Interim Measures of Protection”) and Article 32 (“Form and Effect of the Award”) of the UNCITRAL Arbitration Rules. The arbitral tribunal shall have no authority to award punitive damages. In addition, unless otherwise expressly provided in the Contract, the arbitral tribunal shall have no authority to award interest in excess of the London Inter-Bank Offered Rate (“LIBOR”) then prevailing, and any such interest shall be simple interest only. The Parties shall be bound by any arbitration award rendered as a result of such arbitration as the final adjudication of any such dispute, controversy, or claim.

17.0 PRIVILEGES AND IMMUNITIES:

Nothing in or relating to this Contract shall be deemed a waiver, express or implied, of any of the privileges and immunities of the United Nations, including its subsidiary organs.

18.0 TAX EXEMPTION

18.1 Section 7 of the Convention on the Privileges and Immunities of the United Nations provides, inter-alia that the United Nations, including its subsidiary organs, is exempt from all direct taxes, except charges for public utility services, and is exempt from customs duties and charges of a similar nature in respect of articles imported or exported for its official use. In the event any governmental authority refuses to recognize the United Nations exemption from such taxes, duties or charges, the Contractor shall immediately consult with the UNDP to determine a mutually acceptable procedure.

18.2 Accordingly, the Contractor authorizes UNDP to deduct from the Contractor's invoice any amount representing such taxes, duties or charges, unless the Contractor has consulted with the UNDP before the payment thereof and the UNDP has, in each instance, specifically authorized the Contractor to pay such taxes, duties or charges under protest. In that event, the Contractor shall provide the UNDP with written evidence that payment of such taxes, duties or charges has been made and appropriately authorized.

19.0 CHILD LABOR

19.1 The Contractor represents and warrants that neither it, nor any of its suppliers is engaged in any practice inconsistent with the rights set forth in the Convention on the Rights of the Child, including Article 32 thereof, which, inter alia, requires that a child shall be protected from performing any work that is likely to be hazardous or to interfere with the child's education, or to be harmful to the child's health or physical mental, spiritual, moral or social development.

19.2 Any breach of this representation and warranty shall entitle UNDP to terminate this Contract immediately upon notice to the Contractor, at no cost to UNDP.

20.0 MINES:

20.1 The Contractor represents and warrants that neither it nor any of its suppliers is actively and directly engaged in patent activities, development, assembly, production, trade or manufacture of mines or in such activities in respect of components primarily utilized in the manufacture of Mines. The term "Mines" means those devices defined in Article 2, Paragraphs 1, 4 and 5 of Protocol II annexed to the Convention on Prohibitions and Restrictions on the Use of Certain Conventional Weapons Which May Be Deemed to Be Excessively Injurious or to Have Indiscriminate Effects of 1980.

20.2 Any breach of this representation and warranty shall entitle UNDP to terminate this Contract immediately upon notice to the Contractor, without any liability for termination charges or any other liability of any kind of UNDP.

21.0 OBSERVANCE OF THE LAW:

The Contractor shall comply with all laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations bearing upon the performance of its obligations under the terms of this Contract.

22.0 SEXUAL EXPLOITATION:

22.1 The Contractor shall take all appropriate measures to prevent sexual exploitation or abuse of anyone by it or by any of its employees or any other persons who may be engaged by the Contractor to perform any services under the Contract. For these purposes, sexual activity with any person less than eighteen years of age, regardless of any laws relating to consent, shall constitute the sexual exploitation and abuse of such person. In addition, the Contractor shall refrain from, and shall take all appropriate measures to prohibit its employees or other persons engaged by it from, exchanging any money, goods, services, offers of employment or other things of value, for sexual favors or activities, or from engaging in any sexual activities that are exploitive or degrading to any person. The Contractor acknowledges and agrees that the provisions hereof constitute an essential term of the Contract and that any breach of this representation and warranty shall entitle UNDP to terminate the Contract immediately upon notice to the Contractor, without any liability for termination charges or any other liability of any kind.

22.2 The UNDP shall not apply the foregoing standard relating to age in any case in which the Contractor's personnel or any other person who may be engaged by the Contractor to perform any services under the Contract is married to the person less than the age of eighteen years with whom sexual activity has occurred and in which such marriage is recognized as valid under the laws of the country of citizenship of such Contractor's personnel or such other person who may be engaged by the Contractor to perform any services under the Contract.

23.0 AUTHORITY TO MODIFY:

Pursuant to the Financial Regulations and Rules of UNDP, only the UNDP Authorized Official possesses the authority to agree on behalf of UNDP to any modification of or
