### A. Introduction

#### 1. General

Purpose of RFP: Development of programming to facilitate engagement between MOI/ANP officials and security policy community, including production of documentary on police-community engagement.

#### 2. Cost of proposal

The Offeror shall bear all costs associated with the preparation and submission of the Proposal, the UNDP will in no case be responsible or liable for those costs, regardless of the conduct or outcome of the solicitation.

### B. Solicitation Documents

#### 3. Contents of solicitation documents

Proposals must offer services for the total requirement. Proposals offering only part of the requirement will be rejected. The Offeror is expected to examine all corresponding instructions, forms, terms and specifications contained in the Solicitation Documents. Failure to comply with these documents will be at the Offeror's risk and may affect the evaluation of the Proposal.

#### 4. Clarification of solicitation documents

## 8. Proposal form

No Proposal may be withdrawn in the Interval between the deadline for submission of proposals and the expiration of the period of proposal validity specified by the Offeror on the Proposal Submission Form.

## **E. Opening and Evaluation of Proposals**

### **25. Opening of proposals**

The procuring entity will open the Proposals in the presence of a Committee formed by the Head of the procuring UNDP entity.

### **26. Clarification of proposals**

To assist in the examination, evaluation and comparison of Proposals, the Purchaser may at its discretion, ask the Offeror for clarification of its Proposal. The request for clarification and the response shall be in writing and no change in price or substance of the Proposal shall be sought, offered or permitted.

### **27. Preliminary examination**

The Purchaser will examine the Proposals to determine whether they are complete, whether any computational errors have been made, whether the documents have been properly signed, and whether the Proposals are generally in order.

Arithmetical errors will be rectified on the following basis: If there is a discrepancy between the unit price and the total price that is obtained by multiplying the unit price and quantity, the unit price shall prevail and the total price shall be corrected. If the Offeror does not accept the correction of errors, its Proposal will be rejected. If there is a discrepancy between words and figures the amount in words will prevail.

Prior to the detailed evaluation, the Purchaser will determine the substantial responsiveness of each Proposal to the Request for Proposals (RFP). For purposes of these Clauses, a substantially responsive Proposal is one which conforms to all the terms and conditions of the RFP without material deviations. The Purchaser's determination of a Proposal's responsiveness is based on the contents of the Proposal itself without recourse to extrinsic evidence.



A Proposal determined as not substantially responsive will be rejected by the Purchaser and may not subsequently be made responsive by the Offeror by correction of the non-conformity.

## 28. Evaluation and comparison of proposals

A two-stage procedure is utilized in evaluating the proposals, with evaluation of the technical proposal being completed prior to any price proposal being opened and compared. The price proposal of the Proposals will be opened only for submissions that passed the minimum technical score of 70% of the obtainable score of 1000 points in the evaluation of the technical proposals.

The technical proposal is evaluated on the basis of its responsiveness to the Term of Reference (TOR).

In the Second Stage, the price proposal of all contractors, who have attained minimum 70% score in the technical evaluation, will be compared. The contractor will be awarded to the Contractor offering the lowest price.

## E. Award of Contract

### 29. Award criteria, award of contract

The procuring UNDP entity reserves the right to accept or reject any Proposal, and to annul the solicitation process and reject all Proposals at any time prior to award of contract, without thereby incurring any liability to the affected Offeror or any obligation to inform the affected Offeror or Offerors of the grounds for the Purchaser's action

### 30. Purchaser's right to vary requirements at time of award

### 31. Signing of the contract

Failure of the successful Offeror to comply with the requirement of Clause 24 or Clause 25 shall constitute sufficient grounds for the annulment of the award and forfeiture of the Proposal security if any, in which event the Purchaser may make the award to the next lowest evaluated Offeror or call for new Proposals.



## Annex II-General Conditions of Contract for Professional Services

### 1. LEGAL STATUS

The Contractor shall be considered as having the legal status of an independent contractor vis-à-vis UNDP. The Contractor's personnel and sub-contractors shall not be considered in any respect as being the employees or agents of UNDP or the United Nations.

### 2. SOURCE OF INSTRUCTIONS

The Contractor shall neither seek nor accept instructions from any authority external to UNDP in connection with the performance of its services under this Contract. The Contractor shall refrain from any action which may adversely affect UNDP or the United Nations and shall fulfil its commitments with the fullest regard to the interests of UNDP.

### 3. CONTRACTOR'S RESPONSIBILITY FOR EMPLOYEES

The Contractor shall be responsible for the professional and technical competence of its employees and will select, for work under this Contract, reliable individuals who will perform effectively in the implementation of this Contract, respect the local customs, and conform to a high standard of moral and ethical conduct.

### 4. ASSIGNMENT

The Contractor shall not assign, transfer, pledge or make other disposition of this Contract or any part thereof, or any of the Contractor's rights, claims or obligations under this Contract except with the prior written consent of UNDP.

### 5. SUB-CONTRACTING

In the event the Contractor requires the services of sub-contractors, the Contractor shall obtain the prior written approval and clearance of UNDP for all sub-contractors. The approval of UNDP of a sub-contractor shall not relieve the Contractor of any of its obligations under this Contract. The terms of any sub-contract shall be subject to and conform with the provisions of this Contract.

### 6. OFFICIALS NOT TO BENEFIT

The Contractor warrants that no official of UNDP or the United Nations has received or will be offered by the Contractor any direct or indirect benefit arising from this Contract or the award thereof. The Contractor agrees that breach of this provision is a breach of an essential term of this Contract.

### 7. INDEMNIFICATION



The Contractor shall indemnify, hold and save harmless, and defend, at its own expense, UNDP, its officials, agents, servants and employees from and against all suits, claims, demands, and liability of any nature or kind, including their costs and expenses, arising out of acts or omissions of the Contractor, or the Contractor's employees, officers, agents or sub-contractors, in the performance of this Contract. This provision shall extend, inter alia, to claims and liability in the nature of workmen's compensation, products liability and liability arising out of the use of patented inventions or devices, copyrighted material or other intellectual property by the Contractor, its employees, officers, agents, servants or sub-contractors. The obligations under this Article do not lapse upon termination of this Contract.

## 8. INSURANCE AND LIABILITIES TO THIRD PARTIES

8.1 The Contractor shall provide and thereafter maintain insurance against all risks in respect of its property and any equipment used for the execution of this Contract.

8.2 The Contractor shall provide and thereafter maintain all appropriate workmen's compensation insurance, or its equivalent, with respect to its employees to cover claims for personal injury or death in connection with this Contract.

8.3 The Contractor shall also provide and thereafter maintain liability insurance in an adequate amount to cover third party claims for death or bodily injury, or loss of or damage to property, arising from or in connection with the provision of services under this Contract or the operation of any vehicles, boats, airplanes or other equipment owned or leased by the Contractor or its agents, servants, employees or sub-contractors performing work or services in connection with this Contract.

8.4 Except for the workmen's compensation insurance, the insurance policies under this Article shall:

(i) Name UNDP as additional insured;

(ii) Include a waiver of subrogation of the Contractor's rights to the insurance carrier against UNDP;

(iii) Provide that UNDP shall receive thirty (30) days written notice from the insurers prior to any cancellation or change of coverage.

8.5 The Contractor shall, upon request, provide UNDP with satisfactory evidence of the insurance required under this Article.

## C. 9. ENCUMBRANCES/LIENS

The Contractor shall not cause or permit any lien, attachment or other encumbrance by any person to be placed on file or to remain on file in any public office or on file with UNDP against any monies due or to become due for any work done or materials furnished under this Contract, or by reason of any other claim or demand against the Contractor.



## 10. TITLE TO EQUIPMENT

Title to any equipment and supplies that may be furnished by UNDP shall rest with UNDP and any such equipment shall be returned to UNDP at the conclusion of this Contract or when no longer needed by the Contractor. Such equipment, when returned to UNDP, shall be in the same condition as when delivered to the Contractor, subject to normal wear and tear. The Contractor shall be liable to compensate UNDP for equipment determined to be damaged or degraded beyond normal wear and tear.

## 11. COPYRIGHT, PATENTS AND OTHER PROPRIETARY RIGHTS

UNDP shall be entitled to all intellectual property and other proprietary rights including but not limited to patents, copyrights, and trademarks, with regard to products, or documents and other materials which bear a direct relation to or are produced or prepared or collected in consequence of or in the course of the execution of this Contract. At the UNDP's request, the Contractor shall take all necessary steps, execute all necessary documents and generally assist in securing such proprietary rights and transferring them to UNDP in compliance with the requirements of the applicable law.

## 12. USE OF NAME, EMBLEM OR OFFICIAL SEAL OF UNDP OR THE UNITED NATIONS

The Contractor shall not advertise or otherwise make public the fact that it is a Contractor with UNDP, nor shall the Contractor, in any manner whatsoever use the name, emblem or official seal of UNDP or the United Nations, or any abbreviation of the name of UNDP or the United Nations in connection with its business or otherwise.

## 13. CONFIDENTIAL NATURE OF DOCUMENTS AND INFORMATION

13.1 All maps, drawings, photographs, mosaics, plans, reports, recommendations, estimates, documents and all other data compiled by or received by the Contractor under this Contract shall be the property of UNDP, shall be treated as confidential and shall be delivered only to UNDP authorized officials on completion of work under this Contract.

13.2 The Contractor may not communicate at any time to any other person, Government or authority external to UNDP, any information known to it by reason of its association with UNDP which has not been made public except with the authorization of UNDP; nor shall the Contractor at any time use such information to private advantage. These obligations do not lapse upon termination of this Contract.

## 14. FORCE MAJEURE; OTHER CHANGES IN CONDITIONS

14.1 Force majeure, as used in this Article, means acts of God, war (whether declared or not), invasion, revolution, insurrection, or other acts of a similar nature or force which are beyond the control of the Parties.



- 14.2 In the event of and as soon as possible after the occurrence of any cause constituting force majeure, the Contractor shall give notice and full particulars in writing to UNDP, of such occurrence or change if the Contractor is thereby rendered unable, wholly or in part, to perform its obligations and meet its responsibilities under this Contract. The Contractor shall also notify UNDP of any other changes in conditions or the occurrence of any event which interferes or threatens to interfere with its performance of this Contract. The notice shall include steps proposed by the Contractor to be taken including any reasonable alternative means for performance that is not prevented by force majeure. On receipt of the notice required under this Article, UNDP shall take such action as, in its sole discretion, it considers to be appropriate or necessary in the circumstances, including the granting to the Contractor of a reasonable extension of time in which to perform its obligations under this Contract.
- 14.3 If the Contractor is rendered permanently unable, wholly, or in part, by reason of force majeure to perform its obligations and meet its responsibilities under this Contract, UNDP shall have the right to suspend or terminate this Contract on the same terms and conditions as are provided for in Article 15, "Termination", except that the period of notice shall be seven (7) days instead of thirty (30) days.

## 15. TERMINATION

- 15.1 Either party may terminate this Contract for cause, in whole or in part, upon thirty days notice, in writing, to the other party. The initiation of arbitral proceedings in accordance with Article 16 "Settlement of Disputes" below shall not be deemed a termination of this Contract.
- 15.2 UNDP reserves the right to terminate without cause this Contract at any time upon 15 days prior written notice to the Contractor, in which case UNDP shall reimburse the Contractor for all reasonable costs incurred by the Contractor prior to receipt of the notice of termination.
- 15.3 In the event of any termination by UNDP under this Article, no payment shall be due from UNDP to the Contractor except for work and services satisfactorily performed in conformity with the express terms of this Contract. The Contractor shall take immediate steps to terminate the work and services in a prompt and orderly manner and to minimize losses and further expenditures.
- 15.4 Should the Contractor be adjudged bankrupt, or be liquidated or become insolvent, or should the Contractor make an assignment for the benefit of its creditors, or should a Receiver be appointed on account of the insolvency of the Contractor, UNDP may, without prejudice to any other right or remedy it may have, terminate this Contract forthwith. The Contractor shall immediately inform UNDP of the occurrence of any of the above events.

## 16. SETTLEMENT OF DISPUTES

### 16.1. Amicable Settlement

The Parties shall use their best efforts to settle amicably any dispute, controversy or claim arising out of, or relating to this Contract or the breach, termination or invalidity thereof. Where the parties wish to seek such an amicable settlement through conciliation, the



conciliation shall take place in accordance with the UNCITRAL Conciliation Rules then obtaining, or according to such other procedure as may be agreed between the parties.

## 16.2. Arbitration

Unless, any such dispute, controversy or claim between the Parties arising out of or relating to this Contract or the breach, termination or invalidity thereof is settled amicably under the preceding paragraph of this Article within sixty (60) days after receipt by one Party of the other Party's request for such amicable settlement, such dispute, controversy or claim shall be referred by either Party to arbitration in accordance with the UNCITRAL Arbitration Rules then obtaining, including its provisions on applicable law. The arbitral tribunal shall have no authority to award punitive damages. The Parties shall be bound by any arbitration award rendered as a result of such arbitration as the final adjudication of any such controversy, claim or dispute.

## PRIVILEGES AND IMMUNITIES

Nothing in or relating to this Contract shall be deemed a waiver, express or implied, of any of the privileges and immunities of the United Nations, including its subsidiary organs.



## TAX EXEMPTION

18.1 Section 7 of the Convention on the Privileges and Immunities of the United Nations provides, inter-alia, that the United Nations, including its subsidiary organs, is exempt from all direct taxes, except charges for public utility services, and is exempt from customs duties and charges of a similar nature in respect of articles imported or exported for its official use. In the event any governmental authority refuses to recognize the United Nations exemption from such taxes, duties or charges, the Contractor shall immediately consult with UNDP to determine a mutually acceptable procedure.

18.2 Accordingly, the Contractor authorizes UNDP to deduct from the Contractor's invoice any amount representing such taxes, duties or charges, unless the Contractor has consulted with UNDP before the payment thereof and UNDP has, in each instance, specifically authorized the Contractor to pay such taxes, duties or charges under protest. In that event, the Contractor shall provide UNDP with written evidence that payment of such taxes, duties or charges has been made and appropriately authorized.

## 19 CHILD LABOUR

19.1 The Contractor represents and warrants that neither it, nor any of its suppliers is engaged in any practice inconsistent with the rights set forth in the Convention on the Rights of the Child, including Article 32 thereof, which, inter alia, requires that a child shall be protected from performing any work that is likely to be hazardous or to interfere with the child's education, or to be harmful to the child's health or physical mental, spiritual, moral or social development.

20.1 The Contractor represents and warrants that neither it nor any of its suppliers is actively and directly engaged in patent activities, development, assembly, production, trade or manufacture of mines or in such activities in respect of components primarily utilized in the manufacture of Mines. The term "Mines" means those devices defined in Article 2, Paragraphs 1, 4 and 5 of Protocol II annexed to the Convention on Prohibitions and Restrictions on the Use of Certain Conventional Weapons Which May Be Deemed to Be Excessively Injurious or to Have Indiscriminate Effects of 1980.

20.2 Any breach of this representation and warranty shall entitle UNDP to terminate this Contract immediately upon notice to the Contractor, without any liability for termination charges or any other liability of any kind of UNDP.

**OBSERVANCE OF THE LAW**

The Contractor shall comply with all laws, ordinances, rules, and regulations bearing upon the performance of its obligations under the terms of this Contract.

**AUTHORITY TO MODIFY**

No modification or change in this Contract, no waiver of any of its provisions or any additional contractual relationship of any kind with the Contractor shall be valid and enforceable against UNDP unless provided by an amendment to this Contract signed by the authorized official of UNDP.



## Annex III- Terms of Reference (TOR)

**Request for proposal (RFP)** – Development of programming to facilitate engagement between MOI/ANP officials and security policy community, including production of documentary on police-community engagement.

### A. Introduction

One of the critical areas of work of the UNDP in Afghanistan is in the area of Crisis Prevention and Recovery, within which there are important projects as the Law and Order Trust Fund for Afghanistan (LOTFA), Counter Narcotics Trust Fund (CNTF), Comprehensive Disaster Risk Reduction Program (CDRRP), and Afghanistan’s New Beginnings Program (ANBP). The UNDP is also working in the area of Democratic Policing known as “police e mardumi” to undertake decentralized activities for building of effective police-community partnership for effective service delivery, accountability and ensuring security based on best democratic policing principles. UNDP in other jurisdictions with similar socio political situations has undertaken innovative programmes to bring the law enforcement agencies closer to their people. The program is known by different names in different jurisdictions. In Afghanistan, the UNDP has undertaken a comprehensive study on Prospects of Democratic Policing in Afghanistan based on extensive field based research in select districts of Kabul. This was undertaken based primarily on Ministry of Interior (MOI’s) priorities and the Ministry has shown keen interest to implement the project with the support of the UNDP. Being satisfied with the initial outcomes, the MoI and UNDP agreed to expand the programme in greater areas of Afghanistan to spread the benefit of the programme to the citizen of the country.

It is usually perceived that the role of police is to establish trust with people through activities that enable them to earn confidence of the people, protect citizens against crime and other related threats to life, property, conscience and independence, and work as an important component of the criminal justice system. The present work includes continuing to make endeavors to build extensive police and community relations at the cities, towns, and villages with the purpose of enforcing rule of law combined with an elaborate public awareness program of their rights and duties which will reinforce the MoI’s role to build legitimacy and earn the trust of people. Capacity development and education of the police, public, media, policy makers, civil society and service delivery with element of accountability and transparency are vital components of the project.

Vision and Objectives of Democratic Policing:

To establish systems and mechanisms in place to achieve Police-community partnership for enhanced local security, service delivery and accountability;

- a. To develop forum/s where Community will exchange views and place grievances representing aspirations/concerns of community members and groups to the local police and local government through a democratic process and receive appropriate response from police and relevant Government agencies.
- b. To develop understanding amongst the rank and file of the police about their legal obligation to



the citizen as well as give them fair idea about the rights of citizen, human rights and obligation of police to be neutral and non discriminatory in their behavior and sensitize them to be sympathetic and respectful towards the concerns of the community.

- c. To develop an environment where community and Police together through partnership will strengthen law enforcement and achieve better personal security situation, by removing fear of crime and activating criminal justice system.
- d. To promote systems which will facilitate development of efficient, accountable, effective and responsive policing?

### **Implementers of Democratic Policing**

*Police e mardumi* is jointly implemented by MOI and the UNDP. The implementation process has been undertaken in coordination with bilateral agencies undertaking police reforms initiatives. Ground initiatives and outreach programs with the public and community groups have been undertaken with the emerging Afghanistan civil society organizations.

### **Project components**

#### **1. Project Facilitation:**

All project activities have been coordinated by a small UNDP project team with MoI.

#### **2. Establish Community Groups and dialogue platforms.**

Community level groups are in the process of being established in districts to communicate with the local police officer on a regular basis on policing issues and are in the process of undertaking the preparation of crime and security plans for the district. The meetings between the community and the police are recorded and action taken or follow up is also undertaken.

#### **3. Community Level Facilitators:**

Civil Society Groups will be facilitating the community-police meetings, document and also capacity builds the community members, leaders and para legals etc. Legal education and communication skills training are undertaken for the police.

#### **4. Capacity Development:**

The *Police e mardumi* efforts have a large capacity development strategy for its various stakeholders. The capacity building is undertaken through workshops, trainings using participatory learning: Police Peer Educators, CSO's, Lawyers, Para Legals, Parliamentarians, Media and Community Security Groups etc. Also a broadcast programme over radio was undertaken informing people about their rights and responsibilities.

#### **5. Initiatives at the Police Stations:**

- Information desks established. Complaints and information recorded, classified according to quality of information, referred to response teams for action and results of action recorded with a provision to generate reports on the nature of disposal of the information containing the process it underwent and the actions taken on the issue...



- A standard documentation process is under preparation for bringing in uniformity in the recording and subsequent disposal of information/complaints received in those Districts.
- Community groups mobilized to provide institutional support for partnership and enhance the capacity of both police and community groups through legal training.
- Develop women’s platform in each District and provide training on rights of women and children.

**6. Civilian and civil society oversight mechanism**

Among many ideas currently in circulation, two types of civil society oversight mechanisms are currently being explored. Civil Society groups and other informed groups such as Parliamentarians, civil society etc are being informed on police reforms processes in an effort to build up a critical mass which can push for overall reforms in the police. Further, a public complaints mechanism such as the 119 which is currently functioning as a hotline at the MOI which is already expanded, in a little modified form, at Kandahar and further plans are there for expansion to Heart, Nangarhar and Mazar. *Police e mardumi* presupposes that establishing such systems will support in building the bridge between the police and public and make the police accountable.

**B. Request for proposal (RFP)** – Development of programming to facilitate engagement between MOI/ANP officials and security policy community, including production of documentary on police-community engagement.

The RFP is split into three (3) separate activities/lots with each lot having an independent technical requirements and price Schedule. Bidders may submit bid for one or more lots/activities.

<b>LOT. 1</b>	Security Seminars: Launch a regular internal security seminar series for MOI officials and other security stakeholders such as MOD and Parliament officials hosted by Afghan think tanks and scholars.
<b>LOT. 2</b>	University Outreach: Implement campaign to improve relations between ANP and university communities, as well as understanding of security policy among students and faculty.
<b>LOT.3</b>	Best Practices Documentary: Develop a written study and documentary in audio and video form to document the successful models of community-police engagement. The documentary, including interviews and footage of actual consultations as well as supporting efforts like training and other engagement activities, would allow wide dissemination of best practices.

**Background**

**Issue:**

“Building public confidence” in the police is a critical priority. To address this, a number of Afghan civil society and international community initiatives have supported community-police engagement mechanisms that strengthen responsiveness and accountability of the police. These



have achieved positive results both in building public trust in the police, and connecting police to community resources that help them perform their duties more effectively, which then strengthens public confidence even further. But these programs are small and often disconnected from each other, and have not yet built national momentum on changing police behavior and public perceptions.

**Objectives:**

**FOR ALL LOTS:**

- Increase accountability and responsiveness of police to public and public confidence in police.
- Build on proven models for police-community engagement, encourage new, creative approaches, and share best practices throughout the Democratic Policing community.
- Maximize the involvement of civil society and research organizations with legitimacy in their communities who can sustain community-police engagement over time.
- Develop awareness among communities and police of the value of regular engagement and capacity to manage this effectively.

**Expected Outputs:**

**FOR ALL LOTS:**

- Presentation of work plan to UNDP/MOI/any other partner/s suggested by UNDP.
- Best Practices Conferences--All contractors will be required to receive a briefing organized by UNDP about existing models and materials for community-police engagement so that they are familiar with lessons learned from previous experience and can share materials or curriculum as appropriate. At the end of the project, another conference will be held to share newly developed best practices.
- Schedule of activity dates

**SPECIFIC INSTRUCTIONS FOR LOT 1: Security Seminars**

Launch a regular internal security seminar series for Afghan think tanks, university scholars, media personalities, writers and research institutes, MOI, MOD, and Parliament officials, and possibly political party leaders. A different think tank/research institute/university, or multiple institutes for panel formats, would make a presentation at each session on critical topics in national internal security.

Outputs for Lot 1 include four components:



1. Arrange a biweekly or at least monthly forum for 8 months for discussion of internal security issues, featuring speakers and discussants from at least 6 Afghan think tanks and research organizations. The forum would vary the format of the discussion, using roundtables, panels, individual presentations followed by question and answer sessions, and debate formats as appropriate to the different topics and the anticipated audience. The forums should provide a platform for discussions between the participants that draw on research by civil society actors and scholars. They should create trust and issue-oriented convergence between these institutions, and foster a culture of well-informed policy formulation and implementation. The forums should encourage and enforce the Chatham House Rule on non-attribution and quoting outside the discussion space.
2. Actively recruit participation by key leaders from MOI, MOD, Parliament, research organizations and other security policy stakeholders. The contractor shall rely not only on publicizing the invitations, but making direct personal contact with those leaders to obtain their commitment to attend regularly. The proposal will indicate names of offices/individuals whose participation will be prioritized. The forums will invite the research institutes in the attachment to participate, as well as other credible Afghan research institutes that conduct analysis and studies on Afghan security issues. For appropriate topics, the forum might include participation of provincial leaders as well as national ones.
3. Encourage and support research organizations to involve some ANP officers or MOI officials in the research process and presentations, so as to achieve the goal of developing capacity in the Ministry to independently handle National Internal Security issues.
4. Identify, in consultation with MOI and the forum participants, six security topics that are priorities for MOI and for Parliamentary committees overseeing police. Commission short studies on these topics from research organizations participating in the forums, including policy recommendations. (Only organizations that provide a speaker for at least one of the forums would be eligible to compete.)

The forum organizer will coordinate with other capacity building efforts, such as the Parliamentary Institute and programs to help MPs understand how to build issue-based platforms.

5. Producing a printed document of the outcome at the end of contract in three languages (Dari, Pashto, and English).

#### **SPECIFIC INSTRUCTIONS FOR LOT 2: University Outreach:**

Design and implement a campaign to improve relations between ANP and university communities, as well as understanding of security policy among students and faculty.



Outputs for Lot 2 include four components, each of which will be carried out over the 8 month period:

1. Convene monthly forums in each of at least 4 public universities, including Kabul University, where MOI/ANP officials meet with students and faculty to discuss security issues security policy questions.
  2. Apply police-community consultation models to campus communities, creating monthly forum in each of at least 4 public universities inside and outside Kabul where ANP, students and faculty can discuss campus safety concerns.
  3. Arrange a series of other activities to improve relations between ANP and university communities such as ANP provision of student services such as safety and self defense classes, ANSF career development and recruiting events, and ANSF-university joint sporting events. Schedule will include 5 such events, approved by UNDP, in each of at least 4 public universities inside and outside Kabul.
  4. Conduct consultations with students, faculty and relevant MOI institutions to develop recommendations for programs to increase recruiting of college graduates into ANSF leadership positions, to enhance university educational offerings to build civilian capacity for management of national security policy and ANSF reform, and to establish exchange programs between ANSF academies and civilian universities on teaching, curriculum, and internships.
4. Producing a printed document of the outcome at the end of contract in three languages (Dari, Pashto, and English).

### **SPECIFIC INSTRUCTIONS FOR LOT 3: Best Practices Documentary**

Develop a 60-minute documentary in audio and video form and a written study in three languages (Dari, Pashto, English) to document the successful models of community-police engagement. The documentary, including interviews and footage of actual consultations as well as supporting efforts like training and other engagement activities, would allow wide dissemination of best practices.

Outputs for Lot 3 include two components:

1. Produce a documentary about existing, successful models of police-community engagement which civil society organizations and police departments could adopt and refine for their own communities. The documentary should include coverage of at least 12 community police consultation or engagement activities. At least three of these would be in-depth coverage, with the others being shorter coverage just to highlight the activities or the thinking behind the initiatives.

A list of Afghan NGO engagement and training activities with police is attached as possible case studies. There may be other successful community-police engagement initiatives to draw from.



In-depth case studies should include at least two of the following community police consultation efforts:

- UNDP Democratic Policing Pilot in Kabul province
- GTZ's Access to Justice initiative in northern provinces
- SDO community consultations in Bagrami and Charysab
- Community Outreach in Helmand

The "human interest" aspect of the documentary is critical so that other citizens can get an idea of how they could initiate community-police consultations themselves. The interviews will help the organizers describe the police community engagement in their own words. Questions would include the following or equivalent lines of inquiry that provide practical guidance on starting community-police engagement:

- What made them think of starting this program? (Any forcing event, crisis, opportunity that got them moving.)
- What makes them think this interaction will improve relations between police and people/conditions of the police/people?
- How did the stakeholders (police/community members) initially react to the idea? How did that change over time?

**9. Security:**



9.1 The responsibility for the safety and security of the Contractor and its personnel and property, and of UNDP's property in the Contractor's custody, rests with the Contractor.

9.2 The Contractor shall:

- (a) put in place an appropriate security plan and maintain the security plan, taking into account the security situation in the country where the services are being provided;
- (b) assume all risks and liabilities related to the Contractor's security, and the full implementation of the security plan.

9.3 UNDP reserves the right to verify whether such a plan is in place, and to suggest modifications to the plan when necessary. Failure to maintain and implement an appropriate security plan as required hereunder shall be deemed a breach of this contract. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Contractor shall remain solely responsible for the security of its personnel and for UNDP's property in its custody as set forth in paragraph 3.1 above.

## 10. Audits and investigations:

Each invoice paid by UNDP shall be subject to a post-payment audit by auditors, whether internal or external, of UNDP or the authorized agents of the UNDP at any time during the term of the Contract and for a period of three (3) years following the expiration or prior termination of the Contract. The UNDP shall be entitled to a refund from the Contractor for any amounts shown by such audits to have been paid by the UNDP other than in accordance with the terms and conditions of the Contract. Should the audit determine that any funds paid by UNDP have not been used as per contract clauses, the company shall reimburse such funds forthwith. Where the company fails to reimburse such funds, UNDP reserves the right to seek recovery and/or to take any other action as it deems necessary.

The Contractor acknowledges and agrees that, at anytime, UNDP may conduct investigations relating to any aspect of the Contract, the obligations performed under the Contract, and the operations of the Contractor generally. The right of UNDP to conduct an investigation and the Contractor's obligation to comply with such an investigation shall not lapse upon expiration or prior termination of the Contract. The Contractor shall provide its full and timely cooperation with any such inspections, post-payment audits or investigations. Such cooperation shall include, but shall not be limited to, the Contractor's obligation to make available its personnel and any documentation for such purposes and to grant to UNDP access to the Contractor's premises. The Contractor shall require its agents, including, but not limited to, the Contractor's attorneys, accountants or other advisers, to reasonably cooperate with any inspections, post-payment audits or investigations carried out by UNDP hereunder.

## 11. Anti-terrorism:

The Contractor agrees to undertake all reasonable efforts to ensure that none of the UNDP funds received under this Contract are used to provide support to individuals or entities associated with terrorism and that the recipients of any amounts provided by UNDP hereunder do not appear on



the list maintained by the Security Council Committee established pursuant to resolution 1267 (1999). The list can be accessed via <http://www.un.org/Docs/sc/committees/1267/1267ListEng.htm>. This provision must be included in all sub-contracts or sub-agreements entered into under this Contract.
